2. Teaching-learning and Evaluation:

Mechanism of Internal External Assessment, Grievnance Redressal System

- The institute owns the utmost responsibility to address the issues of students and the
 expectations of all stakeholders. For which there is well designed and implemented teachinglearning and evaluation process.
- The induction program organised for the first year's students is a week-long program in which
 students are apprised of various departments, curricula, and staff members. The special lectures
 organized during this program also make them more explorative and interactive during
 feedback sessions. They are also provided with the details of examination patterns both for
 theory and practice.
- As the college is affiliated with HPTU thus the Institute implements a well-designed structured
 format for teaching learning and evaluation reforms. The institution has an integrated
 examination platform for continuous internal evaluation in accordance with the university
 examination regulations. In the college, besides on line platform (gcpexam) an examination
 committee is formed to coordinate and conduct internal Examinations.
- Evaluated Sessional theory answer sheets are shown to the students individually and every Sessional assessment is displayed on the notice board. Examination committee supervises the accurate entry of internal marks for submission to the university and for the institute record. The institute has a well-maintained record of all the exams conducted since the inception of the course.

- Student-centric methods are a novel approach to teaching. In traditional methods, only teachers delivered their lectures with less input from students, whereas in novel student-centric methods, faculty and students equally contribute to the class.
- The faculty of our institute uses this novel approach while delivering of their lectures. Institute has an unafraid academic environment in which students have cleared their doubts anytime in their classes. Moreover, also one tutorial class per week is organized for clearing student's doubts and solving problems as well as seminars, and guest lectures organized for students on a particular topic.
- Our college also used various modern techniques for effective learning which include projectbased learning, active learning, collaborative learning cooperative learning in which special oriented sessions like debates on current issues, and quiz competitions on burning issues are organized for students.
- Our college regularly enhanced the practical knowledge of students on a particular subject. For example, the pharmacognosy subject is enhanced by organizing various educational tours or field trips of herbal gardens through which students learned the vast knowledge of medicinal plants. In a similar manner, the students increased their practical knowledge of pharmaceutics subject through industrial exposure by which students are able to learn about the formulation section on a large scale and hospital training of students are playing important role in the subject of pharmacology. The final year project work increased the practical as well as research knowledge of students.



Summary of Workshop Proceedings entitled

* In Silico Molecular Docking, Drug Design and Use of Al in Designing of Graphical

Abstract **

The workshop began with lightening of lamps and invoking the godess of knowledge and wisdom, subsequently the workshop was opened by welcome and keynote addresses by Dr. Vinay Thakur, Director/Principal Govt. Pharmacy College Kangra at Nagrota Bagwan, Dr. Mohit Vij, Associate Professor. Words of Advice and thoughts on the workshop were delivered by the worthy chief guest, Sh. SK Gautam, Joint Director, Department of Technical Education, Govt. of Himachal Pradesh. The experts of the workshop were introduced to the audience and the subdivision of workshop into three different parallel tracks according the interest of participants was informed.

Track-1; Use of Al in designing of graphical abstract

The session begins with a brief detailing of profile of Dr.Vancha Harish by session coordinator. The session started with an overview of Biorender, highlighting its features, functionalities, and applications in scientific communication. Participants were introduced to the platform's user interface and basic navigation. Participants were guided to explore Biorender's template library and icon collection. They learned how to search for specific templates related to their research interests and select relevant icons for their visualizations. The session thereafter broke for lunch.

The session resumed again post lunch for the hands on training on the Biorender software. Participants followed along as facilitators demonstrated how to create a simple scientific illustration using biorender. They learned how to add shapes, labels, and annotations to their diagrams. Participants were given time to practice creating their own scientific illustrations based on a provided prompt or their own research topic. After that, Participants were invited to share their creations and feedback with the group. The track concluded with closing remarks and participants were encouraged to continue exploring Biorender's features and practicing their skills in scientific visualization.

Non-healing wounds have lung been the subject of scientific and clinical investigations. Despite breakthroughs in understanding the biology of delayed wound healing, only limited advances have been made in properly treating wounds. Recently, research into nucleic acids (NAs) such as small-interfering RNA (siRNA), microRNA (suRNA), plasmid DNA (pDNA), apramers, and antisense oligonucleosides (ASDs) has resulted in the development of a latest therapeasic strategy for wound heating. In this regard, dendriners, scatioids, lipid nanoparticles, polymeric nanoparticles, hydrogels, and metal nanoparticles have all been explored as NA delivery seclariques. However, the translational possibility of NA remains a substantial barrier. As a result, different NAs must be identified, and their distribution method must be optimized. This review explores the rule of NA-based therapeutics in various stages of wound healing and provides an update on the most recent findings in the development of NA-based nanomedicine and biomainerials, which may offer the potential for the invention of nevel therapies for this long-term condition. Further, the challenges and potential for miRNA-based techniques to be translated into clinical applications are also highlighted.

1. Introduction

Wound healing is a highly dynamic and complex process of substituting the injured tissue with a newer and healthler tissue [1]. It was reported that -2 % of patients have chronic wounds contributing to high morbidity and mortality and hence require specialized biomedical intensive care [2]. Approximately 4.5 million patients in the United States soffer from chronic wounds, which cost 25 million dollars annually [3,4]. Chronic wounds are more common among the elderly and pose a significant strain on the medical system as treating chronic nonhealing wounds is difficult and costly [5].

An adequate wound dressing provides a defensive barrier that promotes wound healing and prevents further infection of wounds during the wound recovery process [6]. The traditionally used gauses (derived from plants or synthetic materials) are not suitable for active healing, particularly for serious or recurring skin wounds [7,8]. In this regard, current therapeutic options involving the use of stem cells [9-13], cell sheets [13,14], and/or tissue engineered dressings/formulations/

Worldwide, Diabetes mellitus (DM) or Type II, (120M) is considered as commonly occurring. cause of age-related neurological disorder that grow proportionately with risk of obesity. 120M is a chronic disease that is illustrated by hyperinsulinemia hyperglycemia, insulin resistance and body's inability to utilize glucose as energy. Such metabotic abnormalities produces a chronic inflammatory state, as well as changes in lipid metabolism leading to hypertriglycaridemia, thereby producing chronic deterioration of the organs and premature morbidity and mortality. The pathology's effects increase cerebral damage, leading to the rapid onset of neurodegenerative diseases. Hyperglycemia causes oxidative stress in tissues which are susceptible to the complications involved in diabetes, including peripheral nerves. We discuss the concept that peripheral and central nervous system inflammation link the pathogenesis of neurodegenerative disorder and metabolic diseases (120). We also explore the contribution of insulin for neurogenesis, memory formation, learning memory consolidation and its role as neuroprotectant. The mechanism of brain inflammation to defective insulin signaling and neuronal dysfunction was studied. This review focuses on link between insulin resistance and the CNS complication and role of glucose homeostasis in the memory dysfunction associated with diabetes. Lastly, we review recent evidence indicating that targeting defective insulin signaling may provide novel therapeutic possibilities for CNS complications.
